PASTORAL REFLECTION

Greeting friends in Christ,

Where did January go!? Between snow days and snow banks, 2024 has rolled in and we are already underway with what is sure to be a year of change and organizing. I am quite excited about the pastoral goals for this year and the several plans in the pipeline for helping those goals be lived out. We are also anticipating the beginning of Lent this month and we are going to focus our attention on something that winter often does not have us consider - pruning.



Lent is often reflected upon and reacted to as a kind of morose season in the life of the church. Having reflected on this season throughout my brief career thus far, one thing I can say is that I've gotten into the habit of thinking differently about it. Consider the example of Ignatius of Loyola, a saint and mystic of the church, who is not only the patron saint of soldiers but also an example of reflection and imagination refining our faith. The Examen is his most famous practice - the prayerful examination of our lives in the wake of our story with God. In my spiritual direction, I find a regular practice of honest reflection to be liberating.

Lent, I believe, is meant to be more liberating than grotesque in its presentation of our temporary nature. When deciding upon the central symbol for this season this year, a tree being pruned came to mind. Not only does having a tree grow wildly out of control often result in damage to the tree and its surroundings, but so do we at times, in our wandering through life, grow in directions we do not expect. Wounds are acquired, habits are forged, old scars are unearthed, and we find ourselves reacting to our lives rather than responding to them. Lent is our opportunity to look at the growth of our own lives and examine them.

I spent most of the summer examining the trees on the grounds of the parsonage and considering what limbs were providing an encumbering weight and which were providing shade and health. Seeing limbs grow into other trees, jutting into the boughs of another, I feel as though I was beholding the sermon series for this season when I reflect on it. It is a reminder to me that God uses everything for our good and our growth in love. Anticipate a season in which we use our time in worship to examine the experiences of life and what wisdom Christ offers so that we might prune our hearts for more love and grace within.

What Is Our Operating Fund

It is the balance in this fund that determines how much is spent on programs, not the budget. We use the budget as a way of planning for the future and a tool of measurement. When a group in the church works on a budget, they are saying, "This is what we want to do." Throughout the year they look at the budget reports and see what they have been able to do. The difference is the amount of money in the Operating Fund.

The Operating Fund is the lifeblood of Central Church's financial life. As you prayerfully consider your financial commitment for 2024, please ask yourself if you are offering God your **First Fruits or Leftovers**.
