PASTORAL REFLECTION

Greeting friends in Christ,

When you receive this monthly letter we will be firmly within the season of Lent. In worship, we are contemplating what parts of our hearts to prune with God, with the understanding that our hearts need regular tending, as a tree would throughout its life. Trees grow in every direction with new growth every year. And sometimes, that growth takes the tree in directions that are not as helpful years down



the road. At the parsonage, I find myself finding limbs that are growing into other trees! Sometimes some limbs present a great deal of weight and are overgrown. Some limbs are dead and haven't been brought down by the winds of early spring or late autumn. Like tree limbs that have to be carefully and discerningly removed at times, we grow and change in ways that require assessment with our God. This is what Lent is all about - learning what parts of us can be pruned so we can become more loving through God's grace.

In addition to this wilderness season, we are striving to live into the vision God has placed on our hearts. We are called to be the beacon at the center of our community that partners with those around us so that God's kingdom is seen more clearly. Being at the center of town, we have the opportunity to begin the conversations that will better Lake Odessa. On March 27 at 6:00 PM, Central Church will host its first conversation about housing, its disparity, the causes of the issue, and what we can do to change it. We are engaging the entire community to come together and learn and act together. Our keynote speaker is Stacy Moore of the Ionia County Habitat for Humanity with a Q&A after her initial presentation. Expect to leave with the means to make a change.

In conclusion, knowing it is Lent and also knowing that housing is limited and difficult to find, I'm reminded that Jesus was rendered homeless after claiming his identity as the Son of God in our Gospels. Run out of his hometown of Nazareth, Jesus found a home with his disciples and was the guest of many during his ministry, but ultimately the Son of Man "had no place to rest his head." We follow a homeless man into the kingdom of God and thus we are called to offer a home to those who bear Christ's sacred image. Home can mean many things to many different people, but we oftentimes find that home is other people who enrich our souls and instill in us a deeper love for self, neighbor, and God. May your Lenten season move you to be home to those who long for a place to lay their head.

- Help canteen volunteer clean up kitchen. •
- Turn off lights and lock church. •


